

Nominated for the Nightingale Award, coveted amongst Ontario nurses, is South Muskoka's very own Shari LeBlanc. Only 140 Ontario nurses were nominated, but it doesn't come of any surprise to LeBlanc's supervisor, Mary Boyer who says: "Shari is extremely patient and family focused definitely a leader amongst her

peers."

Two grade five students from Bracebridge are racing to celebrate their birthdays – and raising funds for the hospital at the same time. Connor Marling and Andrew Bunker, both students at Macaulay Public School, have been friends since Grade 1 and both share a birthday in June. This June, they both turned 11 and instead of accepting birthday gifts, they asked friends and family to donate the amount they would have spent on their gifts to the South Muskoka Hospital Foundation through a fun event called The Amazing Birthday Race. Modeled after the reality TV series, The Amazing Race, participants had to solve clues and perform tasks at various locations across Bracebridge and to win, be the first to arrive at the final destination.

"It's better than getting a present that one week later you don't like," explains Connor. And there's other motivations for their efforts — both boys have family members that have used hospital services in the past. They held the same event two years ago for their birthdays and raised

more than \$1,300 for Sick Kids Hospital in Toronto, where their brothers had both received treatment. Connor received an Ontario Junior Citizen of the Year nomination for his efforts last time. This year, the funds raised will be directed to the Cardio-Respiratory Unit at South Muskoka Memorial Hospital Site in honour of Connor's father, a heart patient.

Connor's mother, Debbie Marling, along with the help of other volunteers, created the top secret clues for the race. Even Connor and Andrew didn't know the answers so that they could participate in the race. There's ten locations where a task is performed by the contestants, such as finding a key in gooey oatmeal or eating a hot radish or drinking unsweetened lemon juice. Parent "bodyguards" accompany each team, but aren't permitted to help the kids or else risk a five-minute penalty.

Changes afoot for hospital funding across Ontario

The Ontario government is trying to slow the overall growth in health spending across the province and is transforming the way hospitals are funded through a new funding model called Health System Funding Reform. While this funding model is positioning the entire health care system to be more sustainable in the long term, it is also posing significant financial challenges for Ontario hospitals. It compels all hospitals to reconsider the costly duplication of services, and to find ways to reduce waste in the system and find efficiencies that lead to savings.

For the 2013-14 fiscal year, Muskoka Algonquin Healthcare (MAHC) has identified an anticipated funding gap of \$2.4 million, based on a reduction in provincial funding and inflationary pressures associated with labour and other costs. Over the past few months, MAHC has been consulting with staff, physicians, residents of the community and other partners about changes to the way the hospitals in Bracebridge and Huntsville can provide services.

The Board of Directors has endorsed a series of budget solutions that, on an annualized basis, will reduce operating costs by \$2.4 million. The approved solutions include a reduction of five acute care beds at each site and to single site Complex Continuing Care beds at the SMMH Site. The Board also endorsed the single siting of cataract surgery to one site once negotiations to bring in additional surgical services are finalized. Moving the Chemotherapy Day Clinic to the Huntsville site will be revisited by the Board in June, following further consultations with Cancer Care Ontario.

Renovation addresses new standards

Work is afoot to renovate the Central Supply Reprocessing (CSR) department at SMMH Site to align with evolving health care standards.

Operating behind the scenes, the CSR department ensures that reusable medical/surgical instruments are decontaminated, disinfected/sterilized, prepared and stored for future use.

The renovation project will take place this summer and has been made possible through a funding commitment from the Foundation.

"We are so grateful to the community for their support of the Foundation and this project," explains Dawn Major, Manager of Quality and Patient Safety. "Once the renovation is complete, this department will meet all standards and regulations and accreditation requirements around reprocessing.

"All of these standards exist to optimize our ability to facilitate the processes which ensure safe, quality care for our patients." The renovation will improve infection control processes within the department by upgrading the infrastructure with air handling improvements including negative air pressure, and adding non-porous ceilings, automated doors, stainless steel surfaces, new flooring and additional handwashing sinks.

The renovation will also enhance the health and safety of staff through improved work flow and workspaces that will be outfitted with height adjustable sinks and worktables to help our staff avoid injury and work more comfortably.

As a two-sited organization, MAHC is fortunate to be able to rely on the other hospital site in Huntsville for operational support in meeting the reprocessing needs of the South Muskoka site during the transition/renovation period.

By individually packaging and labeling medications specifically for each patient, the new system

not only helps to ensure the right medications are assigned to the



appropriate patient, but also helps to address issues with

possible cross contamination and infection control. Previously, medications unused given in a bottle would have to be discarded for hygienic reasons. With this method, wastage is greatly reduced. All-inall, the Unit Dose Packaging System is an important purchase the purposes of for patient safety and cost-effectiveness.
