region more than doubles, with more and more seasonal residents choosing to spend more and more of their time here. And why not? But it's important not to simply cherish Muskoka as your home away from home without also thinking of South Muskoka Memorial Hospital as your hospital away from home. Because when a medical emergency happens while you, your family, or your friends are at the cottage, SMMH is your first stop to getting help.

SMMH's emergency department sees a significant uptick in visits during the summer months when, in addition to relatively minor injuries, they treat patients with serious and complex medical conditions, some of which may require emergency surgery. Approximately six out of every ten patients who come through the emergency department need some form of diagnostic imaging

or additional testing, such as bloodwork, all of which is provided onsite at SMMH. And SMMH medical professionals are part of a tightly integrated network of health professionals across the province who mutually consult and share knowledge and expertise on unusual and complex cases, allowing more patients to avoid being needlessly transported to urban centres for treatment.

SMMH relies on the generosity of seasonal and year-round residents to recognize and support the vital work being done at the hospital to serve the Muskoka community. Rapid developments in new medical technologies make for a wish-list of equipment necessary to maintain the hospital's high standard of excellence, efficiency, and patient care.

In 2015 I was admitted to SMMH with gallstone-induced pancreatitis. I was terrified. I did not have any idea what a hospital would look like in Bracebridge and was literally afraid that I might die. Then I met Dr. Gupta. He was kind, confident, and honest. Dr. Gupta felt the only relief I would get would be to put a stent in my pancreas. That was surgery number one. Dr. Gupta checked on me multiple times a day on his rounds and came back to the hospital on his days off to check my chart and talk to me. A few days later, we had no choice but to remove the gallbladder. I woke up from surgery to the kindest team of nurses. I cannot describe how loved I felt. Months later at a follow-up appointment in Toronto, my GI specialist was in awe of my story and the talent that exists in Bracebridge. This was not a "cottage hospital." This was an acute health care centre.

It was a weekend in early October, time to winterize the cottage as the season quickly comes to the end. We live on an island on Lake Muskoka. I was storing a boat in the boathouse when a gas line broke and spilled some gas on the floor of the boat. I was using a trouble light to see and the gas ignited. I suffered second-degree burns to my face and hands. Fortunately, the local marina operator saw the fire and came over and called for an ambulance. The ambulance met us at the marina and off we went to South Muskoka Hospital in Bracebridge. Upon arrival at emergency I was quickly attended to by the resident doctor. Pictures of my burns were taken and immediately forwarded to the burn clinic at Sunnybrook Hospital in Toronto. Instructions were received and the nurses and resident removed burnt skin, applied bandages and gave me pain killers. Upon returning to Toronto, I was admitted to Sunnybrook Burn Unit for two weeks of surgery and care. I was very impressed with the staff at South Muskoka as they were competent, caring, and quick to assess and bring together a team to look after me. It was my second visit to emergency at South Muskoka as I had previously spent almost a month there. I can't say enough about the quality of care and the teamwork that is evident in this institution.
